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## What is Rotary?

Rotary is an organisation of business, trades, professional and non-professional men and women who volunteer their time and resources to help others in their local community and throughout the world.

Rotarians provide international humanitarian service, encourage high ethical standards in all vocations and help build goodwill and peace in the world.

Rotary clubs carry out a variety of service projects that address critical issues including poverty, hunger, health issues and illiteracy. Service to youth, especially children at risk, is a major focus.

At the local level, Rotarians develop projects to raise funds, which enable them to provide a wide range of services within their own community.

Rotary's emphasis on youth also includes working with and developing the leaders of tomorrow through, youth exchange programs, sponsorship of youth service clubs and through the provision of career development, leadership development and mentoring programs.



Rotary is the world's first service Club. The first Club was founded in Chicago, Illinois, USA on 23 February 1905 by Paul Harris.

Rotary now has over 1.2 million service minded men and women belonging to over 34,200 Rotary Clubs in nearly every country in the world.

**Rotary's mission** is to provide service to others, to promote integrity and to advance world understanding, goodwill and peace through its fellowship of business, professional and community leaders.

**Rotary's motto** is "service above self".

## What is The Rotary Foundation?

The Rotary Foundation is Rotary's own charity. Its mission is to enable Rotarians to advance world understanding, goodwill, and peace through the improvement of health, the support of education, and the alleviation of poverty.

The Foundation is a not-for-profit corporation supported solely by voluntary contributions from Rotarians and friends of the Foundation who share its vision of a better world. All Rotary Clubs are encouraged to donate to the Foundation each year.

Through Rotary Foundation grants and programs, Rotarians can help change the world. They can finance a well for a village that lacks clean water, improve the environment, or provide scholarships to educate the next generation. The grants and programs available to Rotarians allow them to realize Rotary's humanitarian mission throughout the world, including its number-one goal of eradicating polio.



The Rotary Foundation also supports the service activities of districts locally and abroad through District Grants. Other grants available include Global Grants, and Packaged Grants that support areas of focus such as scholarships, humanitarian projects and vocational training.

Furthermore, the Foundation supports Disaster Recovery events and Educational Programs such as Ambassadorial Scholarships and Group Study Exchange (GSE). Group Study Exchange allows a team of non-Rotarians from a variety of professions to visit a paired Rotary District in another part of the world. Rotarian hosts organise a four to six week itinerary of vocational, educational and cultural points of interest.

The Rotary Foundation is funded by donations from Rotary Clubs around the world. Tamar Sunrise makes an annual donation to the Foundation.

## The Object of Rotary

The object of Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular, to encourage and foster:

- FIRST – The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service;
- SECOND – High ethical standards in business and professions; the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations; and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society;
- THIRD – The application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, business and community life;
- FOURTH – The advancement of international understanding, goodwill and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.

## The 4-Way Test

From the earliest days of the organization, Rotarians were concerned with promoting high ethical standards in their professional lives. One of the world's most widely printed and quoted statements of business ethics is 'The 4-Way Test', which was created in 1932 by Rotarian Herbert J. Taylor when he was asked to take charge of a company that was facing bankruptcy.

This 24-word code of ethics for employees to follow became the guide for all relations with dealers and customers, and the survival of the company is credited to this simple philosophy. Adopted by Rotary in 1943, 'The 4-Way Test' has been translated into more than a hundred languages and published in thousands of ways. It asks the following four questions:

"Of the things we think, say or do:

1. Is it the TRUTH?
2. Is it FAIR to all concerned?
3. Will it build GOODWILL and BETTER FRIENDSHIPS?
4. Will it be BENEFICIAL to all concerned?"



## Declaration of Rotarians in Businesses and Professions

The Declaration of Rotarians in Businesses and Professions was adopted by the Rotary International Council on Legislation in 1989 to provide more specific guidelines for the high ethical standards called for in the Object of Rotary:

As a Rotarian engaged in a business or profession, I am expected to:

- Consider my vocation to be another opportunity to serve;
- Be faithful to the letter and to the spirit of the ethical codes of my vocation, to the laws of my country, and to the moral standards of my community;
- Do all in my power to dignify my vocation and to promote the highest ethical standards in my chosen vocation;
- Be fair to my employer, employees, associates, competitors, customers, the public, and all those with whom I have a business or professional relationship;
- Recognize the honor and respect due to all occupations which are useful to society;
- Offer my vocational talents: to provide opportunities for young people, to work for the relief of the special needs of others, and to improve the quality of life in my community;
- Adhere to honesty in my advertising and in all representations to the public concerning my business or profession;
- Neither seek from nor grant to a fellow Rotarian a privilege or advantage not normally accorded others in a business or professional relationship.

## Responsibilities of Membership

Rotary Club membership carries with it certain responsibilities. As a member of the Rotary Club of Tamar Sunrise you are asked to:

- attend weekly meetings as often as you can – a 50% attendance record should be your minimum goal;
- email an apology if you can't attend a meeting;
- pay an annual due to the club, the District and to Rotary International;
- participate in local or international activities or projects of the Club;
- use your skills, resources and knowledge to assist the service committee on which you serve;
- chair a weekly meeting as per the club roster;
- carry out the role of sergeant when rostered to do so and assist the club in finding interesting guest speakers;
- be encouraged and encourage other members to aspire to leadership or committee roles within the club; and most importantly,
- have fun whenever and wherever possible.

We are also keen to hear any suggestions you may have for a project or any idea you may have to enhance our weekly meeting program or any other aspect of the club. If you have a suggestion, or if you wish to discuss a problem, please don't hesitate to talk to the President or one of the committee members.



**2013 2014 Membership Dues: \$210.00 per annum**

Membership of Rotary does require the payment of a membership subscription. The subscription is paid to the club and covers District dues, Rotary International dues and insurance. Payment of your subscription also entitles you to receive two Rotary magazines, Rotary Down Under and The Rotarian. You can choose whether to receive one or both. The annual membership subscription can be paid in two equal six monthly instalments or part payments can be made in advance on a weekly or monthly basis.

## About our Club

The Rotary Club of Tamar Sunrise was first chartered on 21<sup>st</sup> May 2000. At the time, it was the 50<sup>th</sup> Club to be chartered in District 9830, which covers the State of Tasmania. A new Rotary Club has to be sponsored by an existing club and our sponsor club was the Rotary Club of Launceston.

They identified a need for a breakfast club to be established in Launceston to introduce new people to Rotary who were unable to attend an evening meeting. A committee of the Rotary Club of Launceston was established to oversee the establishment of our new club and once chartered, a representative from this committee, Don McTaggart, took on the role of Club Mentor and guided Tamar Sunrise through the first years of its existence. Don is now considered an Honorary member and a lifelong friend of the Club.

The first meeting of the Rotary Club of Tamar Sunrise was held at Konditorei Café Manfred at 7.00am on Wednesday 8 March 2000. Our Charter night was held on 22 July 2000 at which 25 Charter members were inducted into Rotary.

The club has continued to meet every Wednesday morning although our venue has changed from Konditorei Café Manfred to The Pepper Berry Café to Postreos Café to Café Eleven to Clarion Hotel and finally to The Cube Café at the Aquatic Centre, our current breakfast venue.

## About our Sister Club

In 2005 a special sister club relationship was created with the Rotary Club of Kalayaan from Cagayan de Oro City in the Philippines. The object of the sister club relationship is to promote international goodwill and understanding and to work together on joint humanitarian projects. The signature project of our relationship is the school breakfast program that we jointly run at Malasag Elementary School in Cagayan de Oro City in the Philippines.

## The Weekly Meeting

Every Wednesday morning at 7.00am, the Rotary Club of Tamar Sunrise meet for breakfast. The meeting finishes at 8.00am. The weekly meeting provides our club with the opportunity for fellowship, the chance to listen to an interesting guest speaker, a forum to carry out club business and an appetising breakfast.

The breakfast costs between \$8.00 and \$20.00 per head and provides a choice of breakfast options. If you don't require breakfast, a meeting cost of \$3.00 applies. The cost of our meeting is one of the lowest in the District. It represents value for money, as it not only covers your breakfast and the opportunity to listen to a great guest speaker, but it also allows the club to:



- provide a venue for the meeting;
- cover the breakfast costs of our guest speaker and other special guests;
- help defray the administrative costs of the club.

## The Agenda

As we need to fit a lot into one hour, a tight meeting agenda is followed.

- 7.00 Arrive and fellowship
- 7.10 President opens meeting, welcomes guests and introduces Chairperson.
- 7.12 Chairperson leads Tamar Sunrise Welcome and introduces the Member's Minute
- 7.13 Member's Minute
- 7.15 Chair introduces Guest Speaker (20 minutes with 5 minutes Q/A and vote of thanks)
- 7.40 Chair asks for Director's Reports and General Business
- 7.50 Chair asks Sergeant to conduct Fine Session
- 7.55 Chair hands back to President to close meeting and announce next week's meeting details
- 8.00 Close and Fellowship

The President is joined each week at the head table by the Chairperson and Guest Speaker.

## The Guest Speaker

A guest speaker is scheduled for every meeting except when a club assembly or fellowship meeting is scheduled. The Club is always looking for interesting guest speakers, so if you know of one, advise the secretary.

## The Chairperson's Role

Each week a club member will be asked to chair the meeting. The Chairperson's role is to:

- run the meeting;
- introduce and thank the guest speaker;
- call upon other members to undertake their roles at the appropriate time; and
- collect fines during the Sergeant session.

It is the Chairperson's responsibility to ensure the meeting follows the set agenda. You should prepare in advance for your morning as Chairperson.

## The Sergeant's Role

The Sergeant's role is to provide some light hearted moments in our weekly meeting agenda. This is generally done during the fines session held every meeting. Club members can be fined for



anything and everything and the Sergeant can be known for stretching the truth just a little in order to enhance a story. So look out and watch your back as the Sergeant has ears and eyes everywhere.

The fine session not only provides some light hearted relief but also provides the club with some extra finances for club administration and club projects.

## The Member's Minute

Each week a member is asked to present a Member's Minute. This is a short and sharp 2 minute talk in which the member can share a fact about themselves, their work, their family or a topic of interest to them.

## Apologies

If you are unable to attend a weekly meeting, it is a courtesy to email or text your apology to the secretary prior to the meeting.

## The Board and the Avenues of Service

### What is the role of the Board of Directors?

The board is the club's governing body and our board is made up of the President, Immediate Past President, Secretary, Treasurer and the Directors of each avenue of service. The board meets regularly throughout the year and all club members are welcome to attend the board meetings.

The board is responsible for managing the club affairs and club finances. It is also the role of the board to develop strategies for membership growth, to ensure the programs and policies of the club are being implemented effectively and to pursue new programs and activities to meet the club's ongoing goals. The board is also responsible to ensure that all club members have the opportunity to contribute their ideas and opinions.

### What are the Avenues of Service?

Rotary's commitment to Service Above Self, is channeled through the Avenues of Service, which form the foundation of club activity. Our club appoints a service Director for each of the five avenues of service –

**Community Service** covers the projects and activities the club undertakes to improve life in its community. The Community Service Director is responsible for the community projects and community activities undertaken by the club.

**Club Service** focuses on strengthening fellowship and ensuring the effective functioning of the club. The Club Service Director is responsible for the weekly meeting program, fellowship activities and fund raising activities of the club.



**International Service** encompasses actions taken to expand Rotary's humanitarian reach around the globe and to promote world understanding and peace. The International Service Director is responsible for world community service activities, international exchange activities, polio plus activities and the club's involvement with the Rotary Foundation.

**Vocational Service** encourages Rotarians to serve others through their vocations and to practice high ethical standards. The Vocational Service Director is responsible for promoting Rotary's high ethical standards for business and the professions, for increasing vocational awareness and for developing projects that help members contribute their vocational talents.

**Youth Service** recognizes the positive change implemented by youth and young adults through leadership development activities as Rotary Youth Leadership Award (RYLA), Rotaract and Interact, service projects, and creating international understanding with Rotary Youth Exchange. The Youth Service Director is responsible for overseeing the club's involvement in the various youth programs run by Rotary.

Other roles include:

**Membership** is responsible for recruiting strategies to attract new members and retention strategies to engage and keep existing members.

**Marketing and Promotions** is responsible for public relations and the Club's web site and social media activities.

Each Director will organise a committee to assist them with their responsibilities. Tamar Sunrise encourages all members to nominate themselves for one of the committees and to be actively involved in supporting the programs and activities of the club. If you have a special interest, ask to be involved in that committee.

## What is a Club Assembly?

A club assembly is a special meeting which replaces our regular weekly meeting agenda at different times during the year. A club assembly provides the opportunity for club directors to get together with their committees to discuss and plan the various projects and activities of the club.

## Club Projects & Activities – Local Community Projects

The Rotary Club of Tamar Sunrise has been actively supporting the local community since its very first meeting. The following are some of the ongoing local projects that our club is involved in.

### Books for Babies

This has been our signature project since our first year and the club has received recognition throughout the district for this project by receiving the District's "Literacy Achievement Award".

The goals of this project are to foster in children an enjoyment and love of literature and for parents to develop an understanding of the importance of reading to children from birth. The program is focused in the Ravenswood, Rocherlea, Waverley and Mayfield communities.



Children's books are distributed to new mothers in these areas through the community child health nurses. In addition to the books, the community health nurses also provide supporting information to new parents on the importance of reading to their children from an early age.

The club received Government recognition for this program which eventually led to the Government introducing its own program called "Learn to Read", which replaced our program for a number of years. However, when the government program ceased, Tamar Sunrise was there once again to resume its support.

## Books for Kinder



This project was developed as an extension to the Books for Babies project. It follows the literacy theme by encouraging and promoting the importance of reading to children in kindergarten. At present this project is run at Mayfield Primary School. A quality children's book is chosen and purchased for each kindergarten child at the school. During 'book week' a reading of the book is organized with each class and the books are presented to each child at the conclusion of the reading.

## Emergency Medical Information Book

This is a community service project between local Rotary Clubs and the Tasmanian Ambulance Service. Booklets are distributed to members of the community to record their medical, doctor & family details, medications taken, allergies, etc. The booklets come with a fridge magnet and are designed to be kept on the fridge at all times, enabling paramedics to have immediate access to important medical information, which could save a life.



## Bowel Scan

Bowel scan is a Rotary Community awareness program aimed at early detection of bowel cancer. An annual colorectal screening program is run each year, usually in March, in which over 150,000 bowel scan kits are sold through pharmacies across Australia and returned for pathology testing. Since bowel scan commenced more than 1,000 people with bowel cancer and 5,000 with polyps have been detected.

## Community School Awards

Each year the club presents a Community School Award to the most community minded grade 6 student at one of our partner primary schools.

## Other Local Community Activities

These are just a few of the local activities and projects undertaken by our club. Numerous cash donations have also been given to many worthy community charities such as the Timeout project



run by the Youth Suicide Action Group Committee, The Benevolent Society and the Examiner Winter Relief Appeal to name a few.

## Club Projects & Activities – Youth Programs

We also support a number of local Rotary District youth programs, including:

### Rotary Youth Driver Awareness Program (RYDA)

RYDA is a community road safety initiative delivering practical road safety information targeting attitude and awareness of young drivers and passengers. The program is facilitated in partnership with Rotary, presented by professionals and supported by corporate sponsors. The Program about road safety is directed towards our young people as they approach the period in their life when they start driving a car and ride as a passenger in a car driven by one of their peers. In Tasmania it is presented to students in grade 10. We support this program by partnering with a local high school to encourage participation and by members donating their time on the day.

### Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA)

RYLA is an intensive training program for young community leaders. Those chosen for their leadership potential attend an all-expenses-paid seminar, camp, or workshop to discuss leadership skills and to learn those skills through practice. It is an invaluable personal and professional development program. Typical issues covered are: - the growth and development of self esteem, personal development, stress and self management, personal motivation, communication, time management, goal setting and leadership styles. We support this program by selecting and sponsoring suitable candidates.

### Model United Nations Assembly (MUNA)

Rotary Model United Nations Assembly or MUNA, is all about building bridges of goodwill for world peace and understanding in the minds of our youth. MUNA challenges our youth to respect and tolerate differences of race, religion and nationalism whilst retaining their own individualism and the best of their national traditions. MUNA as a concept arose in North America from the desire of young people to simulate the great debates of the United Nations Assembly. Clubs sponsor grade 10 students who are allocated a country to represent for the weekend.

### Rotaract

Rotaract is a Rotary sponsored organisation for students and young professionals between the age of 18 and 30. It aims to create positive change within the community and around the world and provides unique opportunities that assist its members in becoming the business and professional leaders of tomorrow. Tamar Sunrise sponsored the Rotaract Club of Tamar Valley and continues to provide ongoing support.



## Youth Exchange



The Youth Exchange Program is an International exchange for young people between the ages of 15 and 18. The exchange is for a 12 month period during which time the student is hosted by 3 or 4 families therefore experiencing different lifestyles. It is a reciprocal educational exchange, therefore students must attend school. Spending time abroad as a Rotary Exchange Student is a great opportunity for students to experience a new culture, a new language, to be an ambassador for

Rotary & Tasmania and to build lifelong friendships. Inbound students arrive in July/August & outbound students depart in January.

## Club Projects & Activities – International Projects

### BASA Elementary School

This project extends our educational support to the International arena. Basa Elementary School is a primary school in the District of Trento in the Philippines, a very poor area of the country. To date we have provided funds that have allowed the school to build six elevated cupboards to store books and other school supplies. These cupboards were desperately needed to keep the limited school resources protected from the elements. We have also funded new chairs and tables for the classrooms.



### Philippine Scholarships



The club, with the assistance of some individual sponsors, provides educational scholarships to a number of students from the Basa Elementary School to assist in their further education. A \$125.00 per annum scholarship over 4 years, can assist one student with the costs of their school fees, school equipment, uniform and stationery. In many cases the parents of these students would struggle to send their children to high school without this financial support.



## Twenty Dollar Meal Club – School Meal Program

The Rotary Club of Tamar Sunrise has a sister relationship with the Rotary Club of Kalayaan in Cagayan de Oro City in the Philippines. Through this relationship we have combined to adopt a school in the depressed Barangay district of Cagayan de Oro City and to provide a meal program. On one day a week during the whole school year, many malnourished children at the Malasag Elementary School are provided with a healthy meal to start their day. Tamar Sunrise provides funding for the program through the Twenty Dollar Meal Club. Sponsors pay \$20.00 a year to join the club. Each \$20.00 supports one student in the program for the whole school year. Sponsors are rewarded with a “Certificate of Appreciation” which includes the name of the student their donation supported.



## Disaster Aid Australia

Disaster Aid Australia is a wonderful worldwide program operated by Rotary International which provides disaster relief accommodation and support. The Club supports this program by purchasing a family survival pack each year. A family survival pack costs \$800 and contains a large tent, blankets, water containers, cooking stove, cooking utensils, pots and pans, mosquito nets and much more. Each Disaster Aid Pack is numbered so we can track where in the world our pack is sent.

## Other International Rotary Activities

We also support Rotary International projects such as Polio Plus and the Rotary Foundation with annual donations. In addition we support Group Study Exchange (GSE) which sends young professionals overseas for 4 or 5 weeks in small teams of 5, including a Team Leader, to study overseas vocations.

## Club Projects & Activities – Fundraising Activities

### Agfest Gates

Each year the club is paid to help staff the gates on the Saturday of this agricultural show. Club members are recruited to staff the gates for a two hour shift.

### Distribution of Rotary Christmas Cakes and Puddings

This is a recent addition to our fund raising activities. It involves acting as the distribution club for the cakes and puddings each Christmas. The club receives a commission for each item it sells together with a commission for each box of items it distributes to other clubs in our District.



## Festivale

This is another major fund raising activity for the club. In partnership with the Festivale organizing committee, Tamar Sunrise is paid to help staff the information tent during the 3 day event.

## Bunnings BBQ

Each year the Club runs a Saturday BBQ at the Bunnings Hardware store in Kings Meadows. A great day of fellowship and sausage sizzling provides some handy fund raising.

## New Year on Royal

This is another major fund raising activity for the club. In partnership with the Festivale organizing committee, Tamar Sunrise is paid to help staff the information tent during the New Year's Eve event at Royal Park

## Entertainment Book

The Club sells copies of the Entertainment Book and receives a commission for each copy sold.

## Major Events

The club is proud to be responsible for several significant events that have raised funds for important charities.

### Launceston Responds - Helping Our Tassie Mates



In January 2013, the club held a gala cocktail party to raise funds for the Bushfire appeal. Over \$100,000 was raised on the night.

The event team, led by Danny Gibson was able to create and deliver the entire event in less than a month. The event was a great example of using club member's strength and skills to achieve a great outcome for the community

### Launceston Carols by Candlelight



In December 2013, Tamar Sunrise took the lead role in organising Carols by Candlelight. More than 7,000 people attended the event and \$15,000 was raised for the empty stocking appeal



## Other Information

### What is the Classification List?

Every Rotary Club maintains a Classification List. Each member is assigned a classification relevant to their occupation. For example, if you work for an insurance company, your classification may be “general insurance” or “health insurance”, or if you work for a Bank, your classification may be “banking” or “personal finance”. Clubs are encouraged to maintain a diverse classification list. This ensures that the club has a wide variety of skills and resources available to it through club members to assist with the various club programs.

### What is a Paul Harris Fellow?

A Paul Harris Fellow is awarded to a Rotarian or Non-Rotarian to acknowledge a substantial contribution to the humanitarian and educational objectives of the Rotary Foundation. It is named after Rotary’s founder, Paul Harris. A Rotary Club can award a Paul Harris Fellow after donating US\$1,000 to the Rotary Foundation.
